THE MOTHER TERESA OF SUNSET PARK: Sr. Noraleen Murphy, CSJ '43


famous women in the world; she ministered to the poorest of poor. Noticing the many people dying in the streets of Calcutta, she decided to do something about it. She founded the Missionary Sisters of Charity so that thousands of women could help her in ministering to the sick and the dying. "When we care for a person who is sick and dying," she said, "we touch the suffering body of Christ." All the world knows and loves Mother Teresa of Calcutta.

The people in the Sunset Park section of Brooklyn, New York, and the parish of Our Lady of Perpetual Help had their own Mother Teresa. Her name was Sr. Noraleen Murphy, a member of the Sisters of St. Joseph of Brentwood, L.I. Noraleen came to OLPH parish in the late 1970s. Fr. Tom Joyce invited her to join the parish staff in caring for the poor and the needy of the parish. That is what she did for well over 30 years. Nobody did it better.

Sister Noraleen passed away at the age of 89 in early May 2015. She spent the last few years of her wonderful life at Maria Regina Residence, the Josephite nursing facility in Brentwood. They tell us that she had a peaceful death. I always imagined

that Noraleen would die with her sneakers on. We all have memories of her pacing the streets of the parish wearing her New Balance sneakers — walking down to 2nd or 3rd Avenue, climbing up dark tenement stairways, knocking on doors, stepping into the hallways and kitchens to bring food, clothing, and her valuable assistance to the poor of the neighborhood. From morning to night, Noraleen could be seen out on the streets, going in and out of apartments and stores with shopping bags of clothing, groceries, and even medicine for the needy. She was Sunset Park's Mother Teresa.

Just as Mother Teresa cared for the poor and the dying in the streets of Calcutta — letting them know that they were not alone in their dying, Sr. Noraleen cared for the poor, living on the streets of Sunset Park, doing all she could to

the homes, and the thrift shops of the neighborhoods. We never knew when, or if, she had lunch. The evening would find her attending a church service where she sat, sound asleep, exhausted but resting peacefully in the Lord.

a brand new pair of New Balance sneakers.

By the smile on her face, one would think

she had received a gorgeous fur coat. Noraleen

involved herself in every aspect of parish life. She

began each day with morning Mass — and

then was out the convent door to the streets,

Because of Sr. Noraleen and two other Religious, so many children did not go to bed hungry, so many families managed to pay their monthly rent, and so many saw the face of God. Because of Sr. Noraleen, all of us were better. Calcutta and the world had Mother Teresa. Sunset Park and OLPH parish had Sr. Noraleen Murphy. She is probably now pacing the halls of heaven, searching for someone to help. Not finding anyone there in need, she turns her gaze back on us and continues to intercede on our behalf. Her New Balance sneakers will never wear out. She continues to remind us that it is up to us to pick up where she dropped off and to see Christ in all the less fortunate. It is up to us now to do the walking, the caring, and the loving of all the poor among us.

Bishop McDonnell MHS is lucky to have Noraleen Murphy as a graduate of the Class of 1943.

ABOUT THE AUTHOR CAMILLE MARCHETTA '58

amille Marchetta was born in Brooklyn, NY and was raised in the heart of a large Sicilian family — with grandparents, aunts, and uncles — all living either in their three-story brownstone, or nearby, in an apartment on the same street or, when they were married, just a few blocks away.

When Camille was six years old, one of her aunts broke with tradition and moved with her husband and her cousin 45 minutes across the Whitestone Bridge, up the Hutchinson River Parkway to New Rochelle in Westchester County. It was a daring thing for a family member to do, and it kindled in her a desire for adventure, a love of travel, and a spark of independence.

She often visited her aunt and uncle in Westchester County and felt she was going to another country entering a world of trees and gardens rather than iron railings and concrete sidewalks; swimming in Long Island Sound instead of splashing in the water of an open fire hydrant; playing hide-and-seek across backyards without walls; and softball games not in the street, but in 'The Field' with its giant apple tree (which her friends and she climbed to bring home apples to make pies). One of the older girls introduced her to Canasta and Monopoly and to the grand old library on Main Street, igniting her passion for reading.

In high school Camille was on the staff of the McDonnell newspaper and in college she was the editor of the yearbook, and contributed to their literary magazine.

Although Camille received a scholarship to graduate school, she passed it up and chose to work at NBC in New York — and then moved on to other television and theater companies. Eventually she

went to London to work at Richard Hatton Limited, a theatrical and literary agency — becoming head of the literary department. The agency was small but impressive with clients including wellknown writers, directors, and actors like Sean Connery, Robert Shaw, and many others. With London as her base, she explored the city as well as the English countryside. She went to the Continent on holiday and on business to meet with publishers and theatrical managers about books and plays and clients, taking in as many sites as she could without running herself ragged. She saw the Bois de Bologne, St. Mark's Square, the Uffizi, the Coliseum, the Tivoli Gardens, and found it all to be wonderful.

After eight years of working with writers, she decided to become a writer herself. She finished a screenplay, went to Los

Angeles, found an agent, and was hired to write a script which soon led to an assignment on the *Dallas* mini-series. She joined the staff of the show and remained until it soared to number one in the ratings. With that, her career in television was established. She wrote television movies, pilots for new series, produced *Nurse* and *Dynasty* — in the season it finally crept past *Dallas* in the ratings and reached number one.

In 1985, while in London, Camille wrote a novel, Lovers and Friends. She went on to co-executive produce Falcon Crest, co-author two best selling novels with Ivanna Trump, and work as a story consultant on the CBS television series, Central Park West.

In 1998, her second novel, *The Wives of Frankie Ferraro* was published and her third, *The River, By Moonlight*, in 2007.


IRENE BUSZKO '65 LANDSCAPE ARTIST PAINTS ON LOCATION

orn in Brooklyn, New York, in 1947, Irene holds both a Bachelor's (BFA) and Master's degree in Fine Arts (MFA) from Pratt Institute in Brooklyn and Queens College, Flushing respectively. She began exhibiting in SoHo's Prince Street Gallery in New York City in 1973 with a circle of artists who were passionately committed to what was referred to at the time as the 'New Figuration' (referring to the revival of figurative art in the 1960s which followed a time when art was dominated by abstract art.) Quickly moving from the cooperative through the subsequent Artists' Choice exhibitions of the late 1970s, Buszko began exhibiting in the Tatistcheff Gallery in 1981. At that time, she was painting and recording Queens neighborhoods such as Richmond Hill where she grew up. She began venturing out into New York state locations in the late 1980s when she received the first of two Yaddo Fellowships (Saratoga Springs, New York).

Among other awards, she was "artist in residence" in the Yosemite National Park in California. With her Catskill paintings, Buszko's ambitions have been to record the natural, unspoiled woods, and waterways which have been traditional hunting grounds and vacation or camp grounds essentially free of urban development and industry for the past century.

Trekking her canvases into these essentially unpopulated sites, she continues a plein-air tradition (painting

on location) tradition that has been one of the purist pursuits of American landscape painting since the eighteenth century.

Irene was featured in American Artist Magazine in 1994. The article's author Stephen Doherty described her landscape oil paintings as "capturing the universal elements of the environment she's depicting, whether suburban New York, rural New Jersey, remote Oregon,

or California's Yosemite National Park. These are the spaces in which we all go about our daily lives — the bus stops, boat landings, jogging paths, and gardens where we spend our time together. They encompass the natural beauty that surrounds the life we share. Buszko has eliminated anything that would make the landscape seem exotic, dated, or clearly recognizable so that everyone who views her pictures can immediately identify with the place."

THE ANNEXES — PART TWO

from Memorial, Memorial — The History of Bishop Memorial High School

There were four annexes where many Memorialites began the first two years of their high school journey. In Part One, we explored St. Bartholomew's. In Part Two, we take a look at St. Barbara's and Queen of All Saints.

he *Gleam*, the newsletter published by the students of St. Barbara's, was similar to both the Laurel and the Elm. St. Barbara's was run by the Sisters of St. Dominic. The pastor of St. Barbara's presided over the closing day exercises for 87 departing sophomores during one of the 1960s years. Although a simple ceremony, it was remembered "long and lovingly by all." "Barbarites," as the students were known, had both a freshmen and sophomore basketball team in the early 1960s, and of course, no sports team would have been considered complete without cheerleaders to root for them. Subsequently, a number of cheerleading team members went on to cheer for the Garity Knights, a football team in Glendale, Queens. In 1960, students from St. Barbara's Victory Field and track team brought home a gold medal to the school. Competition reigned, even among different classes, as students competed to collect as many stamps as possible to aid the Dominican nuns who were planning to add a much-needed wing to their novitiate.


Like Memorialites, Barbarites were also excited when the annual trip to Rye Beach approached. They would board the "Hudson Belle" and arrive at Playland after a beautiful cruise with students from Most Holy Trinity, Bishop Dubois, and St. Agnes' boys' schools (who were invited to join them). In 1961, 50 girls traveled to Reading, PA to visit the Convent of St. Michael's. It appears this was an annual trip to encourage vocations among the students to join the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart. There was also a trip to Amityville to take a look at the Dominicans' order and their process of recruitment. Mention of Barbarites attending the spring concert at Bishop's auditorium gave evidence that there was intermingling among the annexes and the main school at some level. St. Barbara's annex closed in 1964.

Queen of All Saints School (QAS) was established as an annex of Bishop's in 1932, but its humble beginnings began in 1911 when it was built. When it opened, QAS was established primarily as a grammar school, but it was also utilized as a girls' high school, housing almost 200 students in four classrooms, originally left vacant to accommodate them. Unlike most annexes, QAS secured its own independent charter as a "school for middle grades." During the 1930s, 40s and 50s, QAS earned an enviable reputation as a school that provided many scholarships to students wishing to attend, and its peak enrollment reached 400 students in the 40s. As was the norm, students remained in their classrooms and teachers went from room-to-room at the end of each class period. By 1963, according to its newsletter, the *Gleaner*, the school had established a very successful basketball team. The school's concerts were held in St. Michael's School auditorium and masses for students were celebrated in the main church, which students referred to as their school chapel.

Spring at QAS was a busy, happy time for the students who either participated in or attended various functions, including Sports Night, the Spring Concert and Dance, the Book Fair, the annual outing to Brentwood and, of course, the boat Rye to Rye Beach along with students from Bishop Loughlin High School. They did very well in the CYO Art Contest and the Diocesan Science Fair. As QAS Grammar School classes began to take over more space, high school registrations were curtailed. Therefore, during the late 1950s and early 1960s, there was a gradual decrease in the number allotted to QAS High School. The actual number of students declined from more than 300 students to less than 200 in September 1963. In addition, during the early 1960s, it began to seem that school annexes in general were outdated and impractical. In February 1964, the staff and students were notified that the QAS annex officially would close at the end of the school year in June 1964. Ninety sophomores "finished" their annex time at QAS and transferred to Bishop's as juniors and 104 freshman advanced, not only to sophomores, but also to the Big Building on Eastern Parkway.

The next issue, Part Three, will feature the last part of the series, the Flushing annex — or 'Little Bishop's' as it was fondly known.

inda Ineus' mom is Haitian and her dad, Bahamian. Her two older brothers — Walkins, who attends the University of Albany, and Lawrence, who attends SUNY-Old Westbury — are both very helpful to Linda as she enters the college process. Although her parents are divorced, she writes, "I love my little broken family because it has made me stronger and the person I am today."

Linda attended St. Catherine of Genoa Elementary School in East Flatbush until the school merged with St. Therese of Lisieux and became Catholic Academy. She is grateful to the school for being the foundation of her education. She was salutatorian of her eighth grade class and chose Bishop Loughlin as her high school because she had a good friend, Kiara Hawthorne '17, who really loved the school. Linda now considers Loughlin her home away from home; she would not want to be anywhere else.

Linda has met many people who have helped her through difficult times. At 16, her family lost many of their possessions in a fire. They struggled to find a place to live and retrieve items in the home not damaged. Her teachers were understanding, allowing her to take extra time with her work. If it were not for the amazing support she received from everyone at Loughlin, she would not have been able to persevere and complete her junior year with a 98 average.

At Loughlin, Linda belongs to many extracurricular activities. She joined the band her freshman year and not only learned an instrument she had never played before, she excelled in it — recently receiving a rating of 'Excellence' at the New York State School Music Association (NYSSMA) — an annual music festival across New York state.

In her junior year, as a member of the National Honor Society, Linda was allowed to travel to different colleges and to participate in different community services.

LaSallian Youth is her favorite extracurricular activity — and she is this year's president. The club has enabled her to meet wonderful people and participate in opportunities to help those less fortunate than she is. Last year she worked in a soup kitchen, preparing food and cleaning up. "Knowing that I made someone's day better makes me happy despite whatever is going on in my own life."

She is also on the volleyball team (which she knew nothing about before joining) and has come to love it. She was captain of the junior varsity and varsity teams, and she received the (Brother) James Bonilla award for Best Defensive Player on the team at the most recent sports award ceremony.

Linda attended the Arthur Ashe Institute for Urban Health in partnership with SUNY Downstate, which introduced and

deepened her interest in the medical field. Through this program, she has met many doctors and others studying to be doctors. Her favorite subject is Math; she also likes English because she loves writing essays and expressing herself. After Loughlin, she plans to attend a college with an excellent Pre-Med program. She is interested in becoming a pediatrician.

Linda says "If I were asked to rate Loughlin, I would give it a ten for the atmosphere, the people, the care, and the interest in my life. I don't think I would feel so loved anywhere else. Loughlin is an amazing school. It has shaped me into the person I am today — and I am so thankful. The thought of graduating from here is bittersweet. I would like to add how thankful I am to the Bishop McDonnell women and all that their contributions do for girls like me. I so appreciate the help they give my mom who is also grateful to Loughlin and to the Bishop McDonnell grads for contributing to our scholarships."

Bishop McDonnell scholarships are distributed and kept for excellent students who hold an average of 90 or above in middle school, submit recommendations from their former teachers and principals, maintain a 90 or above average at Bishop Loughlin, take the TACHS exam for admission to BLMHS, and participate in extra-curricular activities throughout high school.
